ARRANGEMENT OF REGULATIONS

REGULATION

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IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred on the Minister of Investment, Trade and Industry by section 3 of the Control of Goods, Prices and Other Charges Act, the following Regulations are hereby made —

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| <p>1. These Regulations may be cited as the Control of Goods, Prices and Other Charges (Restriction on the Importation of School Uniform) Regulations, 2020.</p> | Citation |
| <p>2. In these Regulations, unless the context otherwise requires —
“school uniform” means school tunic, dress, pinafore, shirt, skirt, pants, slacks, blouse, t-shirt, tie, scarf, hat, jersey, tracksuit for a public or private pre-school, primary, and secondary school; and
“Director” means the Director of the Department of International Trade.</p> | Interpretation |
| <p>3. No person shall import school uniform except with a permit issued under these Regulations.</p> | Restriction on importation of school uniform |
| <p>4. An application for a permit to import school uniform shall be made to the Director, in Form A set out in the First Schedule and accompanied by a valid trading licence and an application fee of P100.</p> | Application for import permit |
| <p>5. Where the Director approves an application for a permit to import school uniform, the Director shall, within 21 days of receiving the application, issue to the applicant, an import permit in Form B set out in the Second Schedule, subject to such conditions as the Director may consider necessary.</p> | Issue of import permit |
| <p>6. An import permit shall be valid for such period as may be specified in the permit.</p> | Period of validity of permit |
| <p>7. Where an application for a permit is refused, the Director shall notify the applicant, in writing, stating the reasons for refusing the application.</p> | Refusal to grant permit |
| <p>8. A person aggrieved by the refusal to issue an import permit under regulation 7 may appeal to the Minister within 30 days of receiving the Director’s decision.</p> | Appeal against refusal to issue permit |
