**CONSTITUTION OF BOTSWANA  
DELIMITATION OF CONSTITUENCIES, 1968**

(Published on 15th November, 1968)

**PROCLAMATION**

By His Excellency  
Sir Seretse M. Khama, Knight Commander of the Most Excellent  
Order of the British Empire  
President of the Republic of Botswana

WHEREAS section 65 of the Constitution of Botswana provides for the appointment by the Judicial Commission of a Delimitation Commission:

AND WHEREAS subsection (1) of section 66 of the Constitution provides that the Delimitation Commission shall as soon as practicable after its appointment submit to the President a report which shall state whether any alteration is necessary to the boundaries of the Constituencies returning Elected Members to the National Assembly:

AND WHEREAS subsection (4) of section 66 of the Constitution provides that the President shall as soon as practicable after the submission of the report by the said Commission by Proclamation published in the Gazette declare the boundaries of the Constituencies as delimited by the Commission:

AND WHEREAS a Delimitation Commission was duly appointed by the Judicial Service Commission, notice of which appointment was published in the *Gazette* of the 14th June, 1968:

AND WHEREAS the Delimitation Commission submitted to me, Seretse M. Khama, President of the Republic of Botswana, the report referred to above on the 17th day of October, 1968:

NOW THEREFORE, I do hereby declare, proclaim and make known that the boundaries of the Constituencies of Botswana for the purpose of the election of Members of the National Assembly shall be as heretofore delimited, that is to say as described in the Schedule to the Proclamation of the Acting Commissioner for the Bechuanaland Protectorate given at Mafeking on the 7th day of August, 1964, and published in the *Government Gazette* of the 13th August, 1964:

AND this Proclamation shall come into force at the next dissolution of the National Assembly.

GIVEN at GABERONES this 8th day of November, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty Eight.
